District Conference – Frank reminded members that the District Conference was only 3 months away and he would like to start getting a team together to attend the conference.

Guest Speaker

Paul Rose was introduced by Stuart Cheyne. Paul grew up in Hawkes Bay attending Arthur Miller primary, Taradale Intermediate and Taradale High School. He trained as an Aircraft Engineer and worked for Air NZ for 18 years before moving to Gladstone as Environmental Advisor at the Gladstone Ports Corporation. He returned to New Zealand almost 4 years ago to take up a similar position with Port of Napier.

Paul spoke on the development of the new No 6 wharf at Napier port. The wharf will be able to handle the newer larger vessels up to 385 metres long with capacity for 8000TEU's. The wharf will reduce the number of extra moves of vessels in the port by 120 per annum. It is the largest wharf being built in NZ and is due for completion in Dec 2022. A new vacuum mooring system will be installed to reduce pressure on the wharf structure.

He explained some aspects of the construction and in particular the environmental impact of the construction and dredging. The port has a number of environmental plans for different aspects of the work and they have been working with iwi and other community groups in developing the plans.

Hard material from the dredging is being dumped in one spot to form a reef while a large volume of the former limestone rock sea wall is being used to form 2 new reefs.

Of particular interest is the work being done to rehome penguins which were living in and around the sea wall. An area has been set aside for penguin boxes and suitable planting and penguins are adjusting well to their new homes.
