Kelvin asked members who were training for the **Walkathon** (Andersons Park, 28 November, 6 am to 6 pm) to record their training hours as counting toward the total distance covered.

Christmas Cheer – Denise Brown provided an update on how this will work: from 27 October there'll be a table with five containers and a 'shopping list'. A couple of options are on the cards; (1) committees would provide one item per week for the next 7 weeks, put it in the appropriate container and repeat for the next item on the list (the initial emphasis being on food items followed by treats for the families) or (2) Denise and Alan could provide the total list of items and committees would commit to delivering everything on the list. There was also a suggestion from the floor that committees could provide vouchers for various activities (movies, mini-golf, other family-related experiences or even petrol vouchers).



3 Minute speaker – Jade Coleman. Jade was sponsored by the club to attend Outward Bound and spoke eloquently about her experiences (including a video showing the range of activities undertaken and lots of wet weather). Jade expressed her gratitude for the club's sponsorship and the opportunity to learn new skills and start friendships she was sure would last a lifetime.





Guest Speaker – Robin Fabish, Principal Tamatea High School (Ngāti Maniapoto, Polish).

Robin both entertained and informed in both his person history and Māori history (and culture). He began his talk by taking up RI President Shekhar Mehta's theme "Serve to change lives" as a principle which describes the role of every educator and one which he personally tries to follow.

Robin has been the principal of Tamatea High for six years. Prior to that he was deputy principal at Te Aute College for three years and Head of Māori at Napier Boys' High School for seven years. He thrives on the opportunity to make a genuine difference in kids' lives.

Robin outlined his family origins; Polish immigrants who arrived in Inglewood via New Plymouth in 1875 and who were initially employed in building roads and the Pukekura Park terraces before acquiring land under the Waste Lands Act which allowed settlers to buy land that had been confiscated from Māori. His mother comes from the Ngāti Maniapoto hapu which resided predominantly in what is now King Country.

Robin recently spent eight months working in the Ministry of Education's National Office on the one of the seven changes being made to NCEA; Parity for Māori knowledge (Mātauranga Māori). Many Māori students have little understanding of their own history and therefore experience a loss of belonging (also commonly experienced by Pasifika students). Boards of Trustees have an obligation to give practical effect to Ti Titiriti o Waitangi and delivery of this NCEA change will assist that.

Robin is also advancing his own education through the completion of doctorate studies (Degree of Doctor of Education; EdD) with his dissertation being "how we (as teachers at Tamatea High School) give effect to Ti Tiriti o Waitangi".

In closing, Robin thanked the club for its ongoing support of Tamatea High School and asked that we share what we learned through his talk with friends and family. He also noted that Tamatea High has no rules for hair colour, tattoos, ear piercings and so on. These don't impact on learning and there are plenty of folk with jobs who have these things!
