She advised that we were extremely grateful for the sponsors who had allowed us to do what we have for the HB Surf Life Saving Club – and other community causes.



She called ArtEx Director Bryan Matthews to the rostrum and he reported on making the project work this year – in the light of covid-19. "Could we do it this year?" we had asked. And we did – but just in time! After so many previous exhibitions, we reviewed the whole show, and reinvented it. New ideas came from



members and further assistance from sponsors. He reported that with a recent welcome donation, we had made \$50,000! This would be used

on local projects by the Greenmeadows Rotary Club, as well as supporting the main recipient, the HB Surf Life Saving Club. Harcourts sponsor James Cooper spoke about the auction and Bryan finished with advice that 1000 hours of volunteer work had gone into the project by club members. Surf Life Saving members were called up and the "notional" cheque (actually representing a "direct bank credit") was clutched for photographs by the club photographer. Parting Thought/Reflection

Mandating vaccinations has caused a problem for some people. Think back fifty years and the then government "mandated" the wearing of seatbelts in cars. Did it work? In the ensuing years the road toll, up in the 700s dropped down to now in the 300s. But your scribe has a personal experience. Also around 50 years ago, driving at 100kph along SH1 around Otaki and Levin (where there was a quadruple fatality earlier this week) a motorist coming towards me crossed the centre line and hit me head on. My car was a complete "right-off". My only injury was a red welt across my chest – from the seatbelt! I sure was glad seatbelts were "mandated," for I can now write this reflection. It is difficult to assess every risky situation yourself and you often have to rely on the advice of experts!
