President Jenny welcomed guest speaker Dr Stephanie Rotarangi, members and partners. Three members joined the meeting via Zoom. The agenda was a little different for this meeting with the speaker's presentation preceding the meal and club business following that.

Welfare: Mort is status quo other than that his new medication regime has begun. For those wanting to visit Colin Clark it was noted that Princess Alexander had moved in and out of isolation in recent times so check before you go. Jill Hanlen is going well and Curly was welcomed back.

President's Notices: President Jenny reported that:

- Both the Club and the Trust were still on budget.
- Due to uncertainty regarding the future COVID situation both RYLA and RYPEN have been cancelled for this year. The caravan weekend in Hastings 4-6 March is still happening.

Service Director Denise Brown reported that providing security assistance over the modified Art Deco weekend had earned over \$1,400 and President Jenny thanked both Denise and Les for their work to make it such a success.

In her capacity as volunteer gardener at Enliven, Denise Brown is seeking donations of plants.

Artex Director Bryan Matthews reported that \$30K had been distributed to the four local surf lifesaving clubs and that Waimarama SLC had put their share toward an outboard motor (now suitably engraved to acknowledge the donation from Greenmeadows Rotary).

3 Minute Speaker Bob Morrison provided a potted history of the Rotary Pathways Trust which is in the process of winding up on the basis that its aims have been met and NCC now incorporate pathways into every new development. The trust has been operating for around 20 years (Bob having been a member for most of that time and secretary for the past 14 years). It has contributed \$millions over that time with two donations of \$25K each coming from Greenmeadows Rotary courtesy of Artex-generated funds.

Guest Speaker Dr Stephanie Rotarangi is Napier City Council's first female CEO in its 147-year history. Growing up in Central and South Otago, Stephanie also lived for a time in Napier with husband Ants. She has held senior roles in a number of fire services, including in Australia during the 2019 bush fires, and moved to Napier with Ants and their three children to take up the CEO role. Her doctorate is in philosophy and she has a Master of Environmental Science degree and a Bachelor of Forestry degree.

One year into the job, Steph is very much enjoying the challenge. NCC is committed to increasing delivery of capital works with \$800m of spend outlined in the 10-year plan. \$445m of this spend is water related with over 50% of that to be spent on improving drinking water. Unfortunately, much of this work is underground so there is not a lot for the public to physically see. The cost of projects is ever increasing because everyone is doing similar work and competing for both materials and resources. On the other hand, she inherited a strong balance sheet with no debt (until now).

Housing is a particular focus and NCC is in partnership with Hastings District Council to drive a Hawkes Bay-focussed programme which reduces red tape, builds what is appropriate, avoids or remediates identifiable issues such as land below sea level, liquefaction risk etc. Last year across the region over 1,000 building consents were approved.

There are three government initiatives which are going to have a significant impact on council operations:

- Three waters. Stephanie has conflicting roles. One as an advocate for the region's aspirations of retaining
 ownership and where Napier has budgeted for a big upfront spend while the government, although having
 the same total spend over 30 years, is proposing a much slower start which won't meet city's immediate
 needs. The other role is to provide opinions as to how the government's proposed policy can be made to
 work.
- RMA reform. The government is proposing three new laws which NCC is working its way through to better understand their implications and opportunities.
- Future of Local Government. Along with the above two, and another six reform proposals the government is
 considering, the objective is to understand how diverse populations, technology change, climate change etc.
 this initiative will look at how the scope of local government activities is impacted and what changes should
 therefore be made to the role of local government.

From an income perspective, rates fund about half of NCC's annual spend with 54 NCC-owned business units (e.g. tourism) funding the other half.

Stephanie said she still can't believe her luck having the job she has. On the other hand, driving around this beautiful city also means she now sees every pothole, tree which needs pruning etc! Lots to be done.
