Announcements

ArtEx Bryan said a roster was going around for listing your choice of duties at the show, plus setting up and taking down. He has heaps of art and now needs heaps of buyers.

Pres. Jenny also referred to circulating lists for both the Quiz and the EIT Awards. She told us that our plates were today sitting on ShelterBox table mats and not our own club ones tonight. She also said that to get in a quiz team you had to tell her (right then) and gave a reminder for the tree planting on Marine Parade on 22 May.

Service Director Denise asked for us all to get to the EIT Awards early so that we can welcome Awardees and their families to the conference centre.

Membership Minutes delivered by *Ian Holyoake* expanded on the World President's call *"Each One Bring One"* by asking how we all got here – originally that is, and then speculated that it was because a friend (who is probably still here) asked you to come. And you did and are still here! Rotary World President (& our Pres. Jenny) are asking for you to do just that – namely bring a friend to Rotary before the end of the calendar year. A short YouTube clip was played dispelling the *"Five Myths of Rotary."*

Almost as if it were some kind of acknowledgement, Pres. Jenny returned to the rostrum and presented Ian with a new *Paul Harris Pin* that contained a "2nd ruby." It recognised his (and Eleanor's) personal donations to the Rotary Foundation. Ian tried to explain that he had received "a few PHFs" over the years for his Rotary activities, as had Eleanor, and that they had elected to make regular payments to TRF as their own personal commitment to "Our Charity."

Youth Director Grandma Gail told us she had visited the youngest youth of our club and found that the parents had been having difficulty sleeping (sounds vaguely familiar - I think.)

Three Minute Speaker

Geoff Bibby talked of the problems of covid, starting with big decisions (whether to take raspberry or orange lollipops) and then went on to elaborate on the Neighbourhood Support that came to the rescue. He talked of meetings continuing for book studies, trout fishing in the Tuki Tuki, and joining the Anglican Bishop and some other Protestants, for a Napier Hill walk which ended (nearly completely it seems) when Geoff managed to race a man and a dog to the top.

Sergeant Mark Dickerson sought to go one better with the covid problems and fined members who had not gone overseas, or the South Island, cycled out of bounds, not worn masks, bought extravagant amounts of toilet paper and flour, zoomed to meetings, read Branson's book (about sliding sideways into heaven and the end of life.) We all paid for this!

Guest Speaker

Immediate Past President Claire Connor of the Taradale Rotary Club appeared at our meeting as the ShelterBox NZ "Champion" for District 9930. She is on the Board of Shelter Box which began in UK around 2000 and Rotary became involved soon after. While we have had Rotary Emergency Response Kits (ERKS) in NZ for many years (and often deployed around the Pacific) the Shelter Boxes are far bigger. They are stored in warehouses all around the world and can be dispatched anywhere in the world where there is an emergency. The "contents" vary slightly to take account of the climate in that area of

deployment. Volunteers (Rotary and other) are trained for different roles from "storing" and "packing" to "deployment" anywhere in the world. Claire told of volunteer training in Queensland, of an "exercise" in the night where the trainees were attacked by mock terrorists. Terrifying!

She showed us all the equipment, tools, shelter, warmth, cooking and demonstrated solar lights (which you can buy). All up the box weighs 40kgs. (They cost \$1500 each.) There is also a "Shelter Kit" that weighs half that amount (costs \$135) – and has tools and material to help disaster victims repair their house. We were told that Ukraine are getting lots of Shelter Boxes at the moment and that our own club has donated \$2000 to this cause. Claire said that we needed a "Club Champion" to be our club representative and keep us up to speed with what they do. (You can quietly "volunteer" for this role to Pres. Jenny.) Words almost fail to describe the sheer greatness and importance of this marvellous project. You can learn lots more though at www.shelterbox.org.nz (Go on, click on it and see.)
