Change in Rotary – Is it really necessary?

President Helen introduced *Membership & PI Director John Mackintosh* who began a Club Forum by referring to Ukraine, (incidentally the home of the RI World Secretary John Hewko) mentioned people dying for their country and then asked if Rotary was dying!

He went on to quote statistics which clearly showed that while the world number had stayed around 1.2 million members for some years, there was a serious decline in numbers in areas and clubs like ours (our club has gone down ten members in the past five years). He told us that the world

president was asking us to "imagine" what Greenmeadows should be like. He spoke of recent lectures and zoom meetings that some of us have been involved in and concluded that there were two alternatives — "stay the same" or "change". He suggested new styles of clubs could be considered, "people of action" cause based clubs, satellite clubs, clubs based around business hubs and a general discussion developed around this.

PP Jenny spoke (& drew out ideas on) "cause based" ideas (e.g. the youth suicide project that attracted contributions from a number of clubs); could the AG for the area get better coordination between clubs; is cost a barrier (ideas for reducing); what do the customers want; what do we want (survey to see?); know what our target is; attract members from projects... (and probably much more).

Ian Holyoake concluded with his observations of the losses he had seen in eight clubs in 45 years, that we are one of the biggest clubs, reminded us to "bring a friend one evening – just as one did for you", that our women membership number was low and finally offered a parting thought.

President Helen concluded with the advice that we would be voting on the proposed new styles of Rotary and Clubs later in September and that webinars are available for those who want further information.

Miscellaneous Meadows Matters

A recent item on polio brought to our attention by a Rotary Reader. Your Editor speculates that these cases are contracted from vaccinations and not new outbreaks somehow connected to the only two countries with wild polio virus still existing, namely Afghanistan and Pakistan. However it shows how we have to remain vigilant until it is completely eliminated – in the largest Rotary project ever in the world.

Polio outbreaks have scientists on alert

Scientists are racing to understand how polio might be spreading in New York State, London and Jerusalem, all of which have found poliovirus in wastewater samples this year. Thanks to high vaccination rates, so far only two cases of polio-related paralysis have been reported, in Jerusalem in February and New York in June. All three areas are boosting immunization efforts, including an ambitious effort to vaccinate all one-to-nine-year-olds in London. The events are yet another reminder of the need for a global understanding of public health, say specialists. "No country in the world is immune to the effects of polio," says global-health researcher Zulfiqar Bhutta. "It's all interconnected."
