BIRDWOOD OR NOT BIRDWOOD - THAT IS THE QUESTION

ntroduced by Denise Primrose, guest speaker Louise Stobbart from Birdwood Gallery told us that her family own and run Birdwood Gallery (out of Havelock North) and they have recently opened more venues in Auckland and Arrowtown.

She explained how 19 years ago they lost their farm in Zimbabwe and came to New Zealand in their 40s to start life again. Louise described Birdwood as an organic evolutionary business employing 30 plus staff members.

They live on the property, and it became their whole life until 2017 (and this is where the story of Birdwood deviates. Ed) when they were burnt out and decided to take a year out - in Vanuatu! They found a property on Santo Island where they leased a plantation villa, were completely off the grid, harnessing rainwater and using solar power.

hey liked it so much that in 2019 they sponsored a South African family to come out to NZ, and look after Birdwood for a year while they went back to Vanuatu to renovate an old house they had purchased on the island.

Around this time they were approached by a billionaire visitor who wanted a week on a tropical island. They had planned for this visit for two years getting everything in order as he was paying an exorbitant amount of money to stay with them. But in March 2020 COVID struck and he decided to go back to Texas instead. (He let them keep the money though!) They stayed on the island themselves but then COVID meant that they then couldn't get back to NZ.

Soon after this, cyclone Harold struck the island and she explained in great detail this experience which devastated not only their house, but the whole island and took 33 lives. They were advised that a Hercules was going to be made available to get them home to NZ and eventually it did. On their return however, they had to isolate in MIQ for 14 days in Auckland.

When going back to Vanuatu recently to take up the job of rebuilding and repainting their home in, they were amazed to find that nature had taken the island back to its verdant beautiful self.

Her advice to the audience was that this was an exciting invigorating time in their lives and "if opportunities come your way - just do it!" She also added the New Zealand's support on these islands is enormous and told us that a Blenheim Rotary club is doing good work on the island crushing bottles and using the powder to build homes with.

Bryan Matthews thanked Louise for her amazing story.
