A CHANGE OF COMMAND REVEALS - "POLIO!"

A s member's arrived, the Rotary Foundation committee members, dressed as WW1 Nurses and white coated Doctors with stethoscopes (See photos below) formed a welcoming line with compulsory Polio vaccines administered – well to most arrivals. (Your scribe missed out so may be infectious!)



Vice President Kelvin stood aside, as did President
Helen (returned from their travels to Canada) and Rotary Foundation
Director Lynne Gibson assumed the Chair for our meeting. Lynne
asked Bob Morrison for his *opening thoughts* and he recalled his
school being closed for a period due to Polio, and noted that we
should be grateful and blessed that we nowadays have a good health
service.

Special welcome back to Pres. Helen & David Tattersall, John Macintosh, Jenny Robertson (from US) and Kevin McCormack.

In lieu of a three minute speaker, Lynne played a PowerPoint prepared by District covering Polio. Some facts: Polio lives in the gut; there are three types, all present the same symptoms; however 95% of people with Polio present no symptoms. Rotary's involvement with polio began in 1979 when over six million people in the Philippine's were vaccinated, eradicating Polio in that Country. Realising the potential, WHO challenged Rotary to raise funds to expand the programme worldwide. Twice the target of US\$120M was raised and the elimination programme took off. Later the Bill and Mellissa Gates Foundation came on board and began donating \$2 for every dollar that Rotary raised – and they still do (We have now spent over US\$2 Billion on this world-wide project. Ed)
