Then he put his taste where his mouth is, or where ours are, and produced six different wines for tasting.

Le Phant Blanc 2021

A blend of Pinot Gris and Viognier which he described as a "starter wine" fresh salty quality, a good partner for Christmas platters and made from grapes squashed in bunches on the stalk.

Le Phant Rose 2022

This is a new wine just launched last week. It is blend of Syrah and Tempranillo grapes. This would be nice served with hams, platters and pizzas.

(NB The name Le Phant, which appears to be a spelling mistake is in fact a deliberate one, dropping the "E" from elephant to make it look French! Well I think that is what he said. Ed)

Sea Viognier 2020

This grape is grown 50 metres from the sea (hence the name). It is harvested when really ripe at the end of the season, is blended and a top seller.

Merlot 2018

This is similar to wine from the Bordeaux Region and the Loire Valley. Grown in Gimblett Gravels, held for four years and "aged" in "French oak" barrels for one year.

Reserve Syrah 2018

This is the same as the wine called Shiraz in Australia (they can't spell). It is very like a Pinot Noir, ripens on the coast and is a classic example of earth and stone which Elephant Hill is famous for. It flavours everything.

Airavata 2017

This is an ancestral name of the Weiss family and is one of the three wines in their icon range. Only made some years, they get one bottle per vine and it is handpicked with meticulous care. It is fragrant, elegant, velvet and smooth.

We could buy these, or any of the others on the previously supplied list – and many of us did! (If you missed out – see details below.)

Graeme Muir then thanked Simon for sharing his knowledge and his beautiful wines, and also thanked him for being one of our Artex sponsors. He avoided "gifting" the speaker the usual bottle of (eLephant) wine!
