Welfare Officer Stuart reported that Colin Clarke has spent some time with Gaye in her retirement village; Trevor Powell was awaiting further results; Don McKenzie was in Auckland for further treatment and all good with everyone else as far as was known.

Announcements

Pres. Helen told of the Stortford Lodge quiz night on 20 May which raises funds for programmes related to Youth Suicide, Life Education and Brain Injury. (See below)

She also spoke about the District grant of \$13,500 allocated to the Napier clubs for dispersal. The groups that we are looking at supporting are Age Concern, Puketapu Parents League, Waiohiki Marae, Bay View Community Trust and the Salvation Army. One of the conditions will be feedback for District and publicity opportunities for the clubs.

Gail Kelly advised that Carol Hall from Napier Rotary had thanked us for our help at the Mission Concert and that further assistance for this might be required again in September (a fair level of *agility* is useful but remember that you get free admission!)

Garth Eyles reported that John Mackintosh's previous Rotary Club in Riccarton has a Trust fund for youth affected by adverse events and wished to make a contribution to H B youth following our cyclone.

A process was discussed and decisions made to work with schools in the Napier area whose students had been impacted. Discussion with local Principals' suggests that assistance with school camp fees would be appropriate. Eight schools have submitted costs for 70 students.

In addition, Eskdale School asked for assistance with the cost of a bus to transport their students to Petane Domain for P E for Term 2 as their own school field is still unusable. Riccarton Rotary agreed to the fund the total cost - \$15,640. Schools are supplying their bank account details and these signify agreement with the conditions of the funding assistance. Once done the agreed amounts will be deposited into the school accounts.

Steve Gillum said he had stuff outside in a Holden - for some reason (so I hope you got it!)

P.E. Kelvin reminded of the upcoming District Training (13 May) for club officers – and others interested. (See notice with last week's bulletin.)

Project Director Fred said that the EIT Awards may be delayed until June.

Editor Ian said that our club had received some good "Cyclone Gabrielle" publicity in the RDU Magazine just published, and commented that we should also note that our meeting was being celebrated on what would have been the 155th anniversary of the birth Rotary Founder Paul Harris. Who would have thought that a little club he set up nearly 120 years ago with four members, would now have 1.2 million members all over the world – doing good!




UNABLE TO PERFORM DUTY?
