She stated that she is not a bureaucrat by nature but loves people and wants to change the outcomes for people who can't help themselves.

She said Napier should be awesome and we're not quite awesome, yet but can be.

The elected members have got their 'Strategy Away Day' next week where they will determine their new vision and their priorities for the city. July 2024 is the first year of the new Long-Term Plan. She said it is essential that the council is open and transparent about changes that may take place.

Questions were asked about:

- Affordable Waters which have been pushed out to 2024.
- The National Aquarium which has no plans in place for refurbishment
- State Highways which are not a council responsibility
- NCC's profile we need to be celebrating what Napier is doing, instead of worrying about what Hastings is doing.
- Our elected members are pressuring Waka Kotahi about our broken bridges.
- Emergencies funds are being looked at for the future.

Louise suggested that we need to raise our concerns with our elected members and take more part in submissions for the council's Long-Term Plan.

Long-Term Plan. Lynne thanked Louise and suggested that we meet again in a few months' time to see the progress.

We pretty much excel in this area of Youth Service with many the youth programmes instituted and supported by Greenmeadows Rotary.


