There have been 10 referrals this year to date, with the students coming from Napier Girls' High School, Hastings Girls' High School and Karamu High School. Good feedback has been received about the project from the students' whanau, and also from the High School Counsellors.

# **Guest Speaker**

Sharon Ross from ADT Medical Alarms, under the torch light of several mobile phones, told us a bit about herself – she has lived in Hawke's Bay for 29 years and has four children and nine grandchildren.

She said she'd been approached by Rotary Clubs to become a member!

Sharon told us that she has a son with disabilities and has a background working in this field.

She emphasized the importance of medical alarms and said that they are Work and Income funded.

The response she gets from people generally is, "I don't need a medical alarm", but she also said that having that assurance is very important.

She gave several examples of how these alarms *have* helped people, and having support from your loved ones is of huge importance. Notably 78% of all calls are urgent. They have three shifts of people on duty to receive the calls 24/7.

She spoke with enthusiasm and extensive knowledge, and how many guest speakers are asked to do this in the dark? (For technical reasons that I won't go into, no photograph was taken of the speaker! Ed)
