WHAT A SPEAKER – WHAT AN IMPRESSION

ntroduced by Bob Brady, whose research would not fit on one page, the reason for that became obvious once Hinewai Ormsby began speaking to us. Chair of the Hawkes Bay Regional Council (and with a husband and brother also so involved) she is steeped in Maori culture, has two children (aged 11 & 8) who bike to school – just like their mother did



in the 1980s. She recited a Maori proverb (that your humble Editor could not properly record) mentioned pulling the shoot from the flax, where the bellbird sang and it would say "the people, the people, the people." (Tāngata)

She then went on to describe Cyclone Gabrielle and the Regional Council response to it. With 200 – 250mm of rain predicted, we got up to 550mm and had a *State of Emergency* for the longest time ever! Aided with slides she described diggers repairing breeches and told of seeking to dispose of one million



cubic meters of silt. They were coordinating five councils from Wairoa to Central HB with a package of \$556 million. Now getting property owners back on track, she mentioned that \$7.8m had been paid out to 4379 people.

After some 20 minutes she finished her presentation and then took questions – for another 20 minutes! There were many and great explanations – including comments from our own "flood affected members" and she also offered to stay afterwards to have personal discussions with some (and she did) and it was noted that she was a flood victim herself.
