# THE CASE OF KIRSA JENSEN

ntroduced by Pres. Kelvin (who made him sound very important) the speaker club member and PDG Ian Holyoake made a presentation on a case that he investigated as a detective some 40 years ago (on 1

September). This was the disappearance of 14 year old Colenso High School girl in 1983. She had been riding her horse on the beach at Awatoto and was last seen at the "gun emplacement site" at about 4pm that day with her horse being recovered around 6pm but no sign of Kirsa between then and now.



lan described the case as one of great "public interest" and said it remained on the front page

of the Napier *Daily Telegraph* and the Hastings *Herald Tribune* newspapers for something like four weeks.

A Power Point showed photos from the newspapers and included one (from *The Listener*) of Ian and his late daughter who shared



some classes at Colenso with the missing girl. He told of the massive search for white trucks, described by a witness as being seen at the scene but none of them could ever be linked to the crime. Then the "interest" returned to that witness when Police discovered that a "strange rope" used to tie up the horse, was scientifically established as having come from the possession

of that witness. He could not explain this and there was no scientific evidence that Kirsa had ever entered his car.

Despite a huge amount of public interest and suggestions from hundreds of people (including psychics, dreamers and clairvoyants) there were no clues that took us to a successful conclusion. We had to assume that she had been kidnapped and murdered but there was no real evidence to link this to any one person.

Virtually every murder case in New Zealand is solved but if you are a Detective Inspector for long enough you may encounter one that was not. This was his one!

Taradale Club member and also PDG, Ross Pinkham added some comments on his role as "O/C Suspects" in this case, when he was a Detective Sergeant in Napier. He described some of the issues they had looked into and also referred to the "many victims" in cases like this, some of whom never get over it.

The case remains "Open" to this day and Ross & Ian indicated that they occasionally meet with the Detective Sergeant who currently holds the file. He says he receives three or four pieces of information most years and these are looked into. The file has recently been converted to a "digitised" form and so now when information comes forward it is a lot easier to check on the file to see whether it has previously been considered and with what result.

#### MISCELLANEOUS MEADOWS MATTERS



#### Foreword

If one spends the greater part of a career carrying out criminal investigations, some of them large or spectacular, there is always a chance of encountering one that remains a mystery. This book describes such a case.

In the normal course of events, the arrest of an offender is the major factor motivating Police, but not so this time, not to me. My objective was to find Kirsa Jensen. I failed, although like her mother, have always clung to a hope that one day something would come to light.

In many such enquiries the accompanying publicity makes the victim, and indeed many players, household names. The whole community feels involved and believe they can appreciate the sadness and loss - but only a mother really knows.

I had a daughter of the same age who went to the same school and on occasions they shared the same teacher. Now that teacher has written her story - but I still have my daughter.

We have long since left Hawke's Bay, my wife and daughter and I - we have left Kirsa Jensen, but not the memories, they will always be with us, as they will be with her mother.

What strength and fortitude this mother showed. If she shed a tear on occasions, then I did not see it, but perhaps my eyes may have been misty too, as they are now.
