He observed that the Rotary Club of Greenmeadows is in good health, stating that club culture relies on fellowship.

He thinks that, "Make Rotary the community connection" is a good catch phrase.

He likened a Rotary club to a softball team with a backstop, a pitcher and everyone in the diamond doing a damned good job.

As Membership Officer he asked who would you bring to a Rotary meeting?

- A family member
- A neighbour
- A work colleagues.
- A friend

They would ask – Why Rotary? And he would answer:

- Friendship

- Doing good in the world

He feels we need to be in the media more – we need to be telling people

what we do – we need to harness every member's potential. We don't sell our features and benefits enough.

He feels all clubs need club mentors – one mentor to five members in a club our size and share the load. He also feels that every club should have membership goals and track where we're going. Projects are reliant on the next generation of Rotarians – not us.

Questioned - he was asked on his view on so many Rotary clubs in one city fighting for the same membership – answering "there is definite room in Napier for a satellite club, maybe somewhere like Clive". Bring them in on one project and give them mentors and you may keep them.

Asked "What does Rotary look like in 10 years' time? He answered by saying "there is huge growth coming from Asian countries and non-gender biased groups."


ROTARY BRANDING

Members may have noticed in recent times that Rotary has changed its "branding" and we are often urged to make sure we get ours up to date. Actually the change happened about ten years ago — and we are still trying to catch up! The badge on our rostrum (often hidden by the theme banner) has recently been repainted. Some members have asked "Is this really necessary?" Our international organisation would argue that we have to keep up to date and the item below is some general Rotary Information that shows how this came about and the changes that have been made over our 118 years of existence.

1 minute to discover an aspect of Rotary

The origins of the Rotary wheel



The first Rotary Club in Chicago began by using a cart wheel that symbolized civilization and movement. Shortly thereafter, the words "Rotary Club" were added above it.

Each new Club created chose this emblem, often supplemented by the name of its city.

In 1910, the Philadelphia Rotary Club proposed the cogwheel, illustrating the joint work to achieve a goal. In 1912, the Association of Rotary Clubs validated this wheel, adding "Rotary International"

For several years, the number and shape of teeth varied, until the adoption of a new wheel at the Dallas Convention in 1929, which is still in use today.

It includes:

- 1. 6 spokes
- 2. 24 teeth symbolizing the spirit of service at any hour of the day
- 3. As well as a keying groove to lock the wheel on its axis and makes it functional
