Jenny Robertson gave the club an update on the Regional 'Lifting the Lid on Youth Suicide' project.

- In the past 6 months 'Lifting the Lid' funding has been used for 14 students from schools across Hastings and Napier.
- Post cyclone Gabrielle two members of the 'Lifting the lid' committee met with school counsellors to present a well-received presentation on the concept once again.
- Several local clubs are now fundraising for this cause and there have been no suicides at secondary school level in 2023 in Hawke's Bay to date.

She also informed the members of the work that has been done at the *Napier Women's Refuge* in the last few months with gardens being created, concrete being removed, and general tidying up and sorting to upgrade the facility. She asked for volunteers for a monthly working bee on the first Wednesday – commencing 1^{st} November from 9am - 12 pm.

He acknowledged the hard work of all club members with a special mention of the Artex committee and in particular Bryan Matthews and Judy McKelvie for the hours of work they had put into this event.

Pres. Kelvin showed a book from the Waikato Rotary Clubs called 'Taste Waikato'. He has copies at \$30 each for those interested. We also learned of Denise Primrose promoting the Hawke's Bay Helicopter Trust Raffle. Tickets are \$50 each, prize is an electric Mustang. (Separate email has been sent to you direct.) Pakowhai School has invited Greenmeadows members to morning tea as a thank you for the money the club donated to the school post Cyclone Gabrielle. Gail and Carol will attend.

Kelvin also announced that next week's meeting is a special program on 'Polio' and to bring notes not coins for the Sergeant's session. (See later notes on colour coding!)

He also wants members to become better informed about the proposed Rotary Regionalisation. He added that nothing will change at ground level for Rotarians, but the managerial hierarchy will be in three levels and that there will be Rotary Specialists who will be more accessible for ground level Rotarians to go to for advice and information.

He then showed us a Bronze Medal which has been awarded to the Rotary Club of Greenmeadows for the \$100,000 which has been donated to Rotary Foundation by this club over the last few years.

Sergeant's Session

Pete Thompson won the meat raffle, and then Graeme Ryan asked a series of Rugby World Cup questions which cost those of us not so knowledgeable in World Cup history a fair amount of money!!

THE HISTORY OF DOLBEL




At this point we got to the three to five minute speaker Garth Eyles - who was actually standing in as the main event, complete with power point. He gained his knowledge and love of the land from his childhood on the Takapau Plains which was built on sludge and silt, and then in the Wairarapa where he learnt about landforms and slips. But he spoke to us about the history of the Dolbel Reserve.

He said that in the 1970s three blocks of the Dolbel Estate was sold to a developer. Eighteen hectares of

this were unsuitable for residential development so it was gifted to the Napier City Council. In 1972 the Taradale Rotary Club were assigned the job of developing this piece of land into a reserve, which they proceeded to do. In 2008 our club was asked to assist with the development of the Bell Block. In 2014 we began the development of the area between the Colenso and Bell Blocks and in 2019 the development of the area between the Colenso and Bell Blocks above the path [known as Wim's Forest].

Over the years Brian Hall has taken 75 kowhai seedlings which he raised at home, up to Dolbel and these have all been planted in what is now known as 'The Hallway'. As reported last week, 'Wim's seat' was concreted into place overlooking all this Greenmeadows Rotary work. This very sturdy and beautiful seat, crafted by Wally Drayton, was carried up the hill by Mark Dickerson (alone – though there were eight supervisors!)





In 2023 the Greenmeadows Rotary members retired from their work in the Dolbel Reserve as they reckon they're all getting 'too old'. The jury is out on that one!

Graeme Muir thanked Garth not only for his informative presentation, but for all the hard work and supervision he has put in over the years into this very worthwhile project. Wim was then toasted by all the members with a shot glass of Square Gin (and shouted by Roz.) Some members couldn't handle it, so others had more than one!! Thanks Wim!



President Kelvin culminated the evening, and thanked members for coming. Robert Pearson made a special vote of thanks to Roz for sharing Wim's Square Gin with us. A special treat – enjoyed by many.

Wearing the Rotary emblem

The Rotary badge, commonly known as "the Wheel," is worn, usually on the lapel or similar position by all Rotary members around the world.

This badge is officially presented on the day of induction of a new member.

Honorary members are also allowed to wear it.

Its role is twofold:

- · show membership in Rotary and pride in being a Rotarian
- identify other Rotarians at random at professional or friendly meetings

Note that wearing the PHF pin does not exempt one from wearing the Rotary badge. Indeed, the PHF pin is a distinction that can be awarded to any deserving person. It does not necessarily mark membership of Rotary

Rotary-approved suppliers can provide badges in various sizes.

Some are magnetic and helps wearing them on various types of clothing.
