IN THE PRESENT BUT LEARNING OF THE PAST MTG HAWKES BAY

Our speaker was Laura Vodanovich, the director of the MTG Hawkes Bay and she has been in post for nine years. Her vision for the museum is "a connected and engaged community – with open minds and open hearts"



She gave a synopsis of the last four years at the museum, starting with the onset of the Corona Virus and mandated vaccinations, mask wearing through to Cyclone Gabrielle and the impact that these events have had on the MTG. The museum also had to close for six months as a result of issues with the sprinkler system in the building. There have also been highlights though – the redoing of the Maori gallery which is now called Koru Taonga – voices of Kahungunu. This is an exhibition of the history of people and places of Ngati Kahungunu and has helped to re-engage lwi locally.

Linda shared how the numbers visiting the museum have increased since the entry fee was waived and how museum staff assisted in the local communities when the Cyclone closed the museum last year. When it reopened, the staff placed messages of hope in the front window along with a big heart and Kia Kaha. Members of the public have been encouraged to add to this with their own messages for Hawkes Bay.

aura is keen to remind everyone that the museum is a regional asset not just under the auspices of Napier council, and touched on the current building project taking place in Hastings. This space, the former Briscoes building, will become an archive space and a place for staff to work and for education. A \$9 million-dollar grant from the government is funding this project but there is still a shortfall of \$1 million for which the museum is fund raising.

Current and forth coming exhibitions include *Purakau o Te Whenua* – stories of our land, the legends of Hawkes Bay, such as Pania and *Te Mata Peak, Eye Spy* – curious stories using our five senses, *Silver Shadows* – the story of Marineland, *Pictures & other words* – celebrating 10 years of the MTG Foundation, a group who have raised, donated or bequeathed funds to help purchase artwork for the museum and *Waka Korero Maori* which encourages learning the Maori alphabet by pronouncing the names of the Kaharehe animal treasures on display.

Laura is also keen to affect a name change for the museum as she feels MTG does not fully reflect what the space represents and would also make it more marketable. She answered numerous questions.

A long standing tradition in Rotary has been the "exchange of banners." This happens when members from one club visit another club – usually when travelling overseas. Clubs used to stitch these to very large wall banners and hang them around the venue for their meetings. Not so much done these days, in Greenmeadows we have "copied" these into table mats. A history of banners is set out below.

Rotary Club banners

One of Rotary's vibrant traditions involves the exchange of club banners among its members.

During meetings and district events, clubs proudly showcase their decorative banners, and Rotarians traveling to different countries often carry these banners to swap with the clubs they visit.

These banners frequently feature symbols or images representing a club's town, region, or country.

Some depict local cultural traditions or showcase artistic elements such as leatherwork, weaving, embroidery, or hand-painted designs, turning many banners into genuine works of art.

The popularity of banner exchanges led the Rotary International Board of Directors to express concern in 1959 about the potential financial burden on clubs, urging members to "exercise discretion, moderation, and measured judgment in making provision for such exchanges."

Despite these concerns, the tradition persists as a means for clubs to express friendship. Rotary's archives house around 20,000 banners, reflecting clubs' hometown pride and their connection to Rotary International.
