He is probably best remembered for his acting career and being instrumental in bringing the Cold War to an end along with former Russian leader, Mikhail Gorbachev. Reagan survived an assignation attempt in 1981 when he was shot outside the Washington Hilton hotel. Although on the margins of death upon

arrival at George Washington University Hospital, he underwent surgery and recovered quickly from a broken rib, punctured lung and internal bleeding.

supplemented his pay from his day job with 3 evening cleaning jobs and a weekend cleaning job to help fund his trip to Munich. A highlight of the games was the 7 gold medals won by American swimmer Mark Spitz, making him the most successful competitor at the games.

The games were marred by what became known as the Munich Massacre. Eight members of the Palestinian militant organisation, Black September, infiltrated the Olympic Village, killing 2 members of the Israeli Olympic team and taking 9 others hostage. They demanded the release of 234 Palestinian prisoners being held in Israeli jails and also the release of the West German imprisoned founders of the Red Army Faction, Andreas Baader and Ulrike Meinhof. West German police ambushed the terrorists, killing 5 of them but the rescue attempt failed and all of the hostages were killed.

While all of this was happening, Alan was unaware of the drama developing due to a lack of English where he was located and it wasn't until later that he saw the news on a live tele-cast.

Alan's friends did themselves proud, Tony Pohill came 9th in the 1500m and Terry Manners came 34th in the marathon.

Dinner will be arranged and this is a **partners evening** so the more the merrier..


Numbers will be confirmed at our Wednesday 14th meeting or you can contact President Kelvin directly. Carpooling will also be arranged.
