LIFE IN EDUCATION & ROTARY – AS HE KNOWS IT

Probably the most senior member of our club (in age or years of membership) Brian Peploe was intorudced by Garth. Born in Dannevirke, in the same house as Brian Ford, in his younger days had been an international badminton player and had taught with Garth's father back in the day.



The theme of Brian's talk was the changes in his life and Rotary over some 40 years.

Firstly he told how he and Pat had moved to Taradale in 1968, just after the Wahine maritime disaster. He had taken up a teaching post as the first assistant at Bledisloe No. 1 School which, with 150 pupils, was, at the time, the largest in Hawkes Bay. (Bledisloe No 2 School was on Guppy Road and this became Arthur Miller primary school.) A young teacher, known to us as Jenny Robertson, worked at the school and they were horrified to learn how many pupils had never seen the sea, despite living so close to the coast. Pupils used to be taken for picnics in the Mission grounds, walking along Meeanee and Church Roads (only part of which was tar sealed) and through farmland and market gardens.

This was just after Taradale Borough Council had merged with Napier Council. Taradale council's only assets were the town hall and the car park surrounding it. Brian has fond memories of seeing the milk being delivered by horse and cart and also recalled the Lee Road extension and the number of car accidents that happened as a result of the changes to the road layout.

aradale Rotary were very keen to get Brian to join their club but he managed to resist and joined Greenmeadows Rotary at the invitation of Brian Ford, and so started his long association. After seven happy years in this area they moved south to Ruahine School, a small rural one near Dannevirke. He there joined Dannevirke Rotary, where he was a member for four years. He spoke about the then dress code – you would get fined if you didn't come to a meeting in a suit and tie, and of course there were no female members of Rotary at that time. The subs were only \$50 and also, each month the secretary had to submit the member's attendance records to District. If a member missed three consecutive meetings without good reason you got struck off. You were expected to make up missed meetings by visiting other clubs. (See today's attendance information below. Ed) All clubs had occupational classifications with only one member per classification. Dannevirke club had a membership of 48, 10 of which were farmers and 4 teachers. This was 'achieved' by being creative

While at Dannevirke Club, the members and partners (the Rotariannes as they were known) were invited to Greenmeadows club in 1978 to celebrate the charter of the Inner Wheel for wives of club members. He remembers meeting Stuart and Heather Cheyne, and a rather strange Dutchman – Wim Snjeider!

Brain helped Dannevirke Club to celebrate its 50th Jubilee. The guest speaker was Sir Keith Holyoake, who was an honorary member of the club. He served as New Zealand's 26th prime minister from 1960-1972 and as Governor General from 1977-1980. He is the only politician to have held both positions. In his speech, he gave anecdotes of his times meeting the Royal Family.

Brian thoroughly enjoyed his time in the Dannevirke Club, where at the Dannevirke Domain, they created a lake complete with bridges and plantings out of the existing dirty pond. He remembers the wind and frosts of Dannevirke and that they had two years of drought out of four. Brian has enjoyed all his years in Rotary and all the roles he has held. His most enduring memory of Rotary though, is the friendships that he has made. He has done *make up's* all over the world. At one meeting in Wisconsin in the US, he met a member who exclaimed that he had met Brian before in NZ at a tour of the Mission Winery! His son had been on exchange to New Zealand, based in Hamilton and his parents had visited him there.

Alan White gave the vote of thanks and presented Brian with a bottle of wine.



Attending meetings is an opportunity, not an obligation

Traditionally, attendance for a Rotary member had meant participating in a regular weekly meeting at the member's club or at another club.

Exceptions were granted only for those who attended the Rotary International Convention or were on official RI business, such as a board or committee meeting or a district conference.

Participation in special club meetings, roundtables, informal gatherings, and service activities could not be counted as attendance.

Recent Rotary research shows that rigid attendance rules and policies are a barrier to attracting new members and engaging current ones.

Further, they exclude young professionals who have developing careers or are starting families.

In response, Rotary International has stipulated that any Rotary club wishing to try a new approach can do so by amending its bylaws.

Clubs are encouraged to relax attendance expectations or not have them at all.
