Ken proved to be the only "born and bred HB original" present, four others came from the UK, none from Aussie


but six from the north of HB, and 10 from south of HB. Mainlanders numbered six. (Yes, the figures don't add up. Some members were clearly concealing their origins.)




GO TO JAIL - DO NOT PASS GO, DO NOT COLLECT \$200

Speaker George Massingham was introduced by Mark Dickerson. George has been at the HB Prison for 16 years, with his title recently changing to General Manager (but he wears Superintendent's epaulets). Prior to this prison he was in the RAF. He has a BSc with honours, specialising in Sports Science.

George joined the Army at school as a reservist at age 18 years, doing weekend training, three years as a reservist, then into the RAF as an infantryman. He served in the Falklands, (on very short notice) after training for service in the then troubled Northern Ireland.





This was followed by another stint in Afghanistan where this time he worked with Gurkha's. Finally, George had two trips to Canada for training in chemical and biological warfare, using live chemicals. The arrival of his first born helped with his decision to leave the RAF and move to New Zealand.

Well – we never really got to jail. But what an interesting speaker. Maybe we have to get him back for Part II

The time was about 7pm (or 1900 hours on the Speaker's *Warriors Watch*) and about 20 of us adjourned to the nearby Duke of Gloucester Hotel where we chatted quietly among ourselves and consumed a very nice meal.

First Polio Case of 2024 Reported from Pakistan



Islamabad, March 14, 2024 – A child has been paralyzed by wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) in Dera Bugti district of Balochistan, marking the first polio case of 2024. The Regional Reference Laboratory at the National Institute of Health notified on Thursday that the virus was detected in stool samples collected from a 30-months-old boy from Sui tehsil of Dera Bugti.

The child had onset of weakness in both lower limbs on February 22,

and the isolated virus belongs to the imported YB3A cluster.
