rom a family that has spent 116 years delivering people (Nimon's

Buses) Katie Nimon is now *looking after* us. So from the bus company to the local transport organisation and now our Member of Parliament. An MP for six months our speaker set out to tell us something of her experience expectations (or lack of). She told us that parliament was something like a theatre and she got "put back in her place!" She spoke of the new terms she had to learn, like: Question Time, First Reading and Second Reading, of days that began at



7.45am and were still going at 7.15pm. There was a little bit of training but a lot of "learning by doing." She described asking questions of Ministers – known a "Patsies" and the most successful with one particular member and "mansplaining." All that said, if you can still walk out of the house and work with those people from all sides "with respect then you are doing your job."

The job in Wellington goes for three days a week for 30 weeks of the year (more if you are a Minister). Select Committees are in the mornings and she enjoys that. She described establishing an office, the rules to comply with, renting an apartment only about 100 metres from parliament. She went on with more new terms such as "Staying on Topic, The way the system works, Personal vote - conscience vote (where you can go whichever way you want - not toe the party line), the Ayes & Noes Doors, Lobby in the lobby and the Cut through doesn't always cut through." She is the "bridge" between the people of Napier and Parliament in Wellington, i.e. "Being our elected representative is her job."

She concluded with the fact that she was the 186th woman in NZ's parliament, that to assist her heavy workload she has an EA and also referred to her concern over gangs, security and beings followed. A period of some 20 minutes of questions followed and finished with Katie's final thought "She is friendly with everybsody, but works better with some than with others; you'll never please everybody!"

BICYCLES, HEALTH & WALKING

General Director of Euro Exim Bank Ltd got economists thinking when he said: "A cyclist is a disaster for the country's economy: he does not buy cars and does not borrow money to buy. He does not pay for insurance policies. He does not buy fuel, does not pay for the necessary maintenance and repairs. He does not use paid parking. He does not cause serious accidents. He does not require multi-lane highways. He does not get fat. Healthy people are neither needed nor useful for the economy. They don't buy medicine. They do not go to hospitals or doctors. Nothing is added to the country's GDP (gross domestic product). On the contrary, every new McDonald's restaurant creates at least 30 jobs: 10 cardiologists, 10 dentists, 10 dietary experts and nutritionists, and obviously, people who work at the restaurant itself. "Choose carefully: cyclist or McDonald's? It is worth considering.



PHIL Cooper gave a talk about an environmental conservation project he is involved with in Central America — The Birds And Beasts Of The Rainforests Of The Austrians' in Costa Rica — at the April meeting of Ravenshead u3a.

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Members were invited to donate to the cause after his presentation and raised £168 towards reforestation of a vital part of the country's rainforest.

Ravenshead u3a, whose monthly members' meetings are held on the second Tuesday of the month, from 10am, in St Peter's Church, hosted a coffee morning in The Centre at St Peter's at the end of April.

It showcased activities the u3a offers those with time flexibility, or who are no longer in full-time work

There are more than 1,000 local u3a charity organisations around the UK, each operating independently with their own trustees, and with a common aim to provide enjoyable, educational and sociable activities for older people at a very low, affordable cost, run by their members for their members.

Trust is organising its first three-day national u3a festival, from 18th-20th July at York University campus. There will be a variety of workshops, lectures, and sporting activities, and Ravenshead u3a is taking a coach full of members to take part on the Friday of the weekend.
