

red then introduced our guest speaker *Jeremy Smith* the CEO of the Hawke's Bay Art Deco Trust. He described himself as a 'man of the world' and a 'song and dance' man.

He stated that the 1931 Hawke's Bay earthquake was actually a gift to the city, because the major damage was all replaced with the beautiful buildings we see today. He told us that the Trust began in 1987 and took off in 1989 acting as a social enterprise.

He outlined how the late Robert MacGregor developed the Heritage Funds Grant in 2017, and this enabled the building owners to work with a paint consultant to 'get the colours right'. The Art Deco walks are conducted 333 days a year and take 22,000 people around the town on these walks per annum. The guides are appraised every three months.

The last Art Deco weekend event went well, and this event contributes more than any other Hawke's Bay event – to the tune of \$17 million! We hosted 18,500 visitors at that last



event. He reported on the various funding streams but related that in 2022 government funding ran out 13 days before the cyclone, and that cyclone had a huge effect of course on that event in that year. Fred related also about the huge impact that the late Pat Benson had on the Art Deco Trust and the buildings. And how lucky we were that he chose to come to Napier.

Graeme Ryan thanked Jeremy and said how he had come to Hawke's

Bay 30 years ago and with his wife being in Tourism, he's enjoyed many an Art Deco events over the years. He wished Jeremy and the Trust well for the future.
