President Kelvin gave a brief precis of the ArtEx history. First held 1982, with Brian Peploe being the only one present now who attended that. Kelvin thanked Steve and Judy for their time and efforts, and their supporting Committee. He also thanked the sponsors, "a key element in the success of the project."

Over the past five years, we have donated \$100,000.00 to HB Surf Life Saving, and around \$1M in total to other recipients. We then saw a graphic and moving brief video taken by Surf Life Savers and others involved in Gabrielle, either rescuing or being rescued.

Bryan Matthews then spoke, acknowledging what (ArtEx Director) Steve & Di had gone through with Cyclone Gabrielle as they were trying to prepare for ArtEx, and his best wishes for the rebuild of their home which has just commenced. Bryan thanked Media Works who provided \$12,000.00 of free advertising for the event. He also thanked Bex as both Manager and sponsor and new sponsors who covered the cost of painting the long boards this year. These sponsors included the Gillum's (through their Company), Langley Twigg, Resene Paints, and Alexander Construction. Elephant Hill approached us to host the event, saving \$10,000.00 in rental, plus sponsored the wine. A major contributor to the success.

# BIANCA CHING: SWITZERLAND

After 1 year of organising, the dream that seemed too good to be true arrived. What feels like not so long ago, my whole life was turned upside down for the better as I set off on my new adventure. After a memorable stopover in Dubai, I arrived at my final destination, Basel, Switzerland. Hallo, ich heiße Bianca und ich bin siebzehn (17) Jahre alt. Ich wohne in Basel Switzerland (der Schweiz) und ich liebe es hier. I have now been here around 3 months and am absolutely loving it, I truly am living my best life all thanks to this opportunity that Rotary has given me.







These are photos of the Rhine in Basel, it is about a 10 minute walk from where I live.

I went to school a day after arriving and got right into the immersion. At school I have 10 compulsory subjects and the hours vary each day between 4-9 hours per day. I am lucky to be in a lovely class who are all very patient of my language journey.

In the last couple of months I have learnt to ski, travelled, my German has improved, I have seen beautiful scenery and met new people. I was fortunate enough that my host family took me on a 2 week ski holiday in the alps where they taught me to ski. They were so patient as I had never skied previously and am not the most coordinated individual. I did quickly learn to stop as I concluded falling over so much was not so fun. I have also travelled around Switzerland mostly for Rotary related events which has been a nice way to see the scenic views. I am also grateful to have gone to southern Spain for 2 weeks. It was an amazing experience and I feel very appreciative that my host family gave me this opportunity to travel with them. The language aspect has definitely been the hardest part. However, I have been surrounded by the German language, so I can understand more and am conversing more in German.

# BIANCA CHING: CONTINUED








I was in Luzern for a Rotary weekend, it ranks among the most beautiful town in Switzerland.

The Swiss culture is, from my experience, similar to our Kiwi culture. Although, one cultural experience was going to a carnival called Fasnacht. It is an annual tradition in Basel celebrating the end of winter and is welcoming spring. It starts at 4am on the first day, where the whole city goes dark and people start marching through the city with lanterns they have designed. It finishes exactly 4 days later with different things happening each day and night. I also went to the parade and I had the honour of walking in a small group so I got the first-hand experience of Fasnacht. The lanterns and themes are supposed to be a funny take on political issues









Coming up at the end of June I am looking forward to my Euro tour. It goes for 17 days and we will visit 10 countries. This trip is organised through Rotary with the other exchange students in Switzerland.
