those savings to members at grass roots level. There will no longer be an Assistant Governor but rather a community leader for each local area instead. Ours will be PDG Grant Spackman. Grant will look after all the clubs between Gisborne and Waipukurau.

There will be Rotary Specialists with resources available to assist the whole of Zone 8. This could be for fund raising ideas, for example. More than 100 of these will be available for New Zealand and Australia.

The hope is to encourage clubs to get together and help each other with projects. Our group is focusing on 3 key areas, the environment and sustainability, youth development and community development. By working together, we can achieve more, extend our reach and increase our impact.

There will be another meeting in 3-4 weeks' time. It is hoped that a plan will be produced to co-ordinate goals. A good example of what can achieved by clubs working together, is the Rotary Pathways Project which has been highly successful in Hawkes Bay.

## **Sergeant's Session**

Scribe Helen put down her pen and took up her role as Sergeant where she relieved members of their hard-earned cash by celebrating *National Tattoo Removal Day* and musing what tattoos club members might have that they would want removing.

## **Speaker – Club Member Ken Hunt**

Relvin Winnie introduced our evening's speaker, Ken Hunt - not that Ken needed much of an introduction! Kelvin did share an interesting tidbit though. Approximately 60 years ago, Ken met a certain young lady on a bus. They went their separate ways however they later reconnected through Rotary at Greenmeadows. Yes - our very own VP Carol Charman!

Ken gave an extremely interesting presentation about "The Million Dollar Egg" a five-year project he was involved with between 2013 and 2018. He shared that back in the mists of time, the inland ranges of Hawkes Bay were home to hundreds and hundreds of burrowing sea birds, which were very important for the development of the plains and a vital food source for the local Māori population. European settlement brought about habitat changes for the birds which now all breed on off shore islands around New Zealand which are predator free.

en then went on to describe the Poutiri Ao ō Tāne, a multi-agency habitat programme with \$1 million invested with an avian focus. The aim was to relocate threatened bird species back to the mainland into a carefully located predator free sanctuary behind Tūtira, to establish a self-sustaining population as part of the ecological restoration of the site and the surrounding Maungaharuru Ranges.

The birds selected were Cook's petrel and Mottled petrel from Whenua Hou, from a small island of 14,000ha off Stewart Island and in a trial, they were taken to Hauraki Gulf. The project was not without its challenges, not the least of which



was getting agreement with host Iwi for Whenua Hou, then HB Iwi & DoC, and also without annoying the endangered resident Kakapo who bred in the new area and feed on Rimu seeds. Ken worked out a plan and the trial went ahead with chicks being flown about NZ. It did not go as well as hoped with only 53 chicks surviving. In the next trial some 250 chicks were brought to a new specially created area in HB. It worked – with Ken buying all the sardines available in the Napier supermarkets to feed the chicks!

In total 368 mottle petrel chicks have been transferred to Hawkes Bay over the five-year period and 99% of these chicks are believed to have successfully fledged. Returning adults have been detected at the site and 2nd generation birds are now breeding there. Finally, the plan worked. (This is a brief summary of Ken's address, more detailed notes will accompany the bulletin as a separate attachment. Ed.)

Brian Peploe gave the vote of thanks and presented a bottle of wine to Ken as thanks for giving his very informative presentation to the club.
