
Peter Thompson sought three more volunteers for the MS appeal at Pak n Sav, Napier on Friday (now just gone).

John Bongiovanni and his Bonsai Passion

elen Tattersall introduced our evening's speaker, John Bongiovanni. Originally from Scotland, emigrating to NZ in 1960 as an eight-year-old, his mother was Scottish and his father Italian. His parents met in Scotland



when his father was a POW there. His father, a gardener, accepted a job on the Wallingford estate in Central HB and John has lived in North Island since then. John did a degree in horticulture at Massey and went on to have a long career with the Ministry of Agriculture. John and Christine moved from Waikanae two and a half years ago, settling in Taradale to be nearer to family.

John gave a fascinating talk about his passion for bonsai. He displayed 14 of his 307 specimens, but only 174 of those are in display pots. He keeps meticulous notes about the provenance and history of each tree.

John gave the caveats that he understands that bonsai are not everyone's cup of tea and that while very passionate, he is not by any means an expert. He has only been doing this for 37 years! His inspiration was sparked by watching the movie "The Karate Kid" in which one of the characters had bonsai trees. His oldest tree is 30 years. It's not as hard as it looks but it is a big responsibility - the trees totally rely on you to keep them watered, fed with the correct nutrients and pruned. He emphasised that they aren't indoor plants but can be brought inside for short periods to be displayed. Because they are trees, albeit miniature, they are happiest outdoors.

John gave us a short history of "bonsai" - Japanese for potted tree, and an exact replica of a natural tree in miniature form. Hieroglyphs in Egypt have shown depictions of bonsai trees but it is in China between the 16th and 11th centuries BC that bonsai really developed, moving to Japan with Buddhist monks in the 12th Century AD. Chinese bonsai are more informal than Japanese bonsai, more of a miniature landscape with more than one tree in each display dish. John's bonsai are a mix of both Chinese and Japanese styles. Trees are grown in three size ranges, large (over 60cm), medium (30-60cm) and small (less than 30cm) and within those there are a number of categories, including informal upright - looks like a natural tree, formal upright, windswept and root over rock. He debunked the myth that bonsai is cruel, after all we prune and shape shrubs and trees in our gardens all the time!
