

PDG Ross (for The Foundation Committee) then spoke on the polio recognition day (24th Oct.) thanked members for their contribution (and upcoming with fines) told us that 13 members from our D.9930 were travelling to Auckland to ride on the "Rotary Polio Train" and told us to take a free polio shirt for further display or fundraising. Most importantly, he pointed out the donations slips on each table for us to use. (Also reproduced below.)

The Club BBQ at Cheyne Estate on 16 Nov. was confirmed. At \$15pp (for meat & charcoal) bring your wine, salad to share and a seat to sit on. Former members are invited. A Board went around for bookings. (Must confirm the week before – for catering purposes.)

Sergeant's Session

Sergeant Curly took up the challenge, Frank with Ticket No. 96 won the raffle and then Curly took us back through time on an America's Cup history tour. He alluded (for some reason) to 'bare breasts', the NZ sailing teams, nominated tables that were the "sailors" the "design team" the "countries" competing and then somehow (confirmed by calculations) some \$343 dollars was raised for the polio campaign. (And added to the auction \$100.)

POLIO – FROM ONE WHO KNOWS

Introduced by Steve Gillum (who recalled his own poio memories, NZ last case n 1998 and now 99.9% eliminated in the world) he told us Mary Ellen Warren was from Canada.

With the aid of slides, Mary Ellen told us about growing up in Ontario, Canada (in the Niagara area) and how in 1952 she contracted polio, got sick and missed school for some years. She described her sypmtoms including her heart stopping and of her

parents only being able to look through a glass window when visiting

her! There were nine others similarly affected in the ward. She went home (in a Cadillac car) with calipers after three months. Her family had great assistance from friends with rides to the hospital and an Aunt sent her a postcard every day for nine months. Insurance only paid for part of her treatment and her family went without a house (or car) and with heavy debt to pay for her treatment.

She spoke of the songs that had been written that related to polio, the polio book "Autumn Ghost" and that the disease was not new for records of it have been found in the tombs in Egypt! She told us of the developments that had arisen, like the creatation of the hospital ICU and the Salk Institute. Long ago coming to NZ she had continued her interest in polio and fighting it. Got involved trying to light up the Tom Parker Foundtain (in Napier) and even tried (without success) to light up the Auckland Harbour bridge, has belonged to a "Cup of Tea Polio Group" and recognises the great work Rotary has done with the polio project and "sticking with the campaign!" (Some picutres below show her efforts.)

Ross Pinkham thanked Mary Ellen and gave her a bottle of wine – not as a cure but as a contribution. As a Parting Thought, Wal Drayton reminded us that for every dollar Rotarians contribute for polio, it wil be matched by two further dollars from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.



Minneapolis to host 2028 Convention

Rotary International has announced that Minneapolis, Minnesota, will host its convention in 2028.

This major global event attracts tens of thousands of Rotary members, along with their friends and families, from around the world each year.

The Rotary and Rotaract clubs in the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul are excited to showcase their beautiful metropolitan area and highlight the incredible community service projects they have underway.

Originally, the Rotary International Board selected Minneapolis to host the convention in 2029.

However, the shift to 2028, with the convention scheduled for May 27-31, provides members with the opportunity to explore an additional location in 2029 before Rotary's 125th anniversary convention in Chicago, Illinois, in 2030.

As of now, a replacement host city for the 2029 convention has not yet been determined.

This adjustment in scheduling allows Rotary members to enjoy an enriching experience in Minneapolis while looking forward to the significant anniversary celebration in Chicago.
