Sergeant's Session



The state is the number one producer of cranberries in the US. The state is also known as the "badger state," so called because of the 1820's lead miners who worked under



ground, not unlike badgers.

The rest of the friendship group introduced themselves and shared information about themselves and their families and how long they have been Rotarians. For some of the members this is their first friendship exchange. Half of the visitors were from La Crosse in the south west of the state, and the remainder from Maddison, the state Capitol.




Our mission
